CULTURALLY SENSITIVE ESL MINISTRY

Food may not be a good topic for the day because a few Muslim students have been fasting – it is Ramadan.

A Chinese elderly gentleman tries to dictate what he should be learning during a beginner's ESL class – to the shock of his young Canadian teacher.

A German student is forthright in her desire to learn the particulars of English grammar, while her Hispanic classmates just want to talk. Can we, as ESL teachers, afford to leave cultural sensitivity to chance?

We know that the world around us doesn't. In the Canadian public school classroom, teachers regularly reinforce the importance of respect for differences through lessons about various cultural traditions. In businesses, employees are required to take courses or seminars on cultural sensitivity, or “anti-discrimination.” The government has made multiculturalism official policy. But what does cultural sensitivity mean in the church and in ESL

ministry? Does it mean “political correctness” or “tolerance”? Does it mean knowing everything there is to know about other cultures? What implications does cultural sensitivity have on teaching?

Ephesians 2:14 tells us that Christ “has broken down in

His flesh the dividing walls of hostility.” How is the church community to live in the light of this, and how do we live it out with our students from different countries, with their diverse cultural and religious backgrounds?

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PURSUE HOSPITALITY

I recently noticed the verse Romans 12:13 - “pursue hospitality.” The Greek word ‘hospitality’ is in two parts: ‘love-foreigner’, and the Greek word ‘pursue’ conveys a rather strong sense of ‘pressing forward’, ‘running after’, ‘seeking after’, ‘striving for’, ‘chasing’, etc. This does not come out

clearly in most translations. We often think of ‘hospitality’ as receiving those who present themselves, not turning them away, but instead caring for them. However, in this verse, it seems a much more active and intentional pursuit is called for, and, in particular, a pursuit of “love for the foreigner.”

What might that look like?

In the Old Testament, the Lord repeatedly drew the attention of his people to 3 typical categories: widows, orphans and foreigners. Our concern with regard to ESL ministries

1. Your home and church neighborhood is increasingly diverse.
 2. You see a connection between being able to build relationships across cultures and building relationships across generations.

 5. You want to promote more than simply being "politically correct"
 6. You want your kids to understand the issues of race and class that exist in the world and in your community.

 8. You want to ensure your church is a welcoming place regardless of a visitor's cultural background.
 9. You want to share the love of Jesus with people in a way that lets them know you respect them as well.

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LORD your God" (Leviticus 19:34).

Henri Nouwen observed that "each of us has a mission in life. Jesus prays to his Father for his followers, saying: 'As you sent me into the world, I have sent them into the world' (John 17:18).

He continues, “We seldom realise fully that we are sent to fulfill God-given tasks. We act as if we have to choose how, where, and with whom to live. We act as if we were simply plopped down in creation and have to decide how to entertain ourselves until we die. But we were sent into the world by God, just as Jesus was. Once we start living our lives with that conviction, we will soon know what we were sent to do.”

This short meditation got me thinking: What is your personal mission in life, and that of your church community? What is your part in the Mission of God?

Is ESL ministry not the heart of God which has touched our hearts? How might we encourage and allow more of His heart in our own programs and endeavours?
